BY THE COMMISSION:

On or about February 23, 2009, the City of Lincoln/Lancaster County, Public Safety Answering Point (Lincoln/Lancaster County) filed a funding request seeking approval for costs for equipment and software necessary for the provision of enhanced wireless 911 services to be paid from the Enhanced Wireless 911 Fund (Fund).

In its original application, Lincoln/Lancaster County sought non-recurring costs in the amount of \$1,299,910.00 for the purchase and installation of equipment necessary to provide enhanced wireless 911 service. However, the county has amended its request with respect to the number of positions and the associated costs. Currently, Lincoln/Lancaster County requesting funding for 13 positions totaling \$911,000.00 of that amount \$118,070.00 is attributable to items for which the Fund has not historically paid. The Commission previously provided funding Lincoln/Lancaster County for equipment from the Therefore, the current application constitutes a second request.

Lincoln/Lancaster County had previously requested that the request be suspended. Subsequently, Lincoln/Lancaster County asked that it be placed on the agenda of the Enhanced Wireless 911 Advisory Board (Advisory Board) for its consideration. The Advisory Board considered the request at its November 2, 2009 meeting and recommended funding be approved for ten (10) of the fourteen (14) positions requested based upon the wireless/landline allocation factor established in Docket No. 911-017/PI-116.

Because this request represented a second purchase of equipment for the county and presented a policy question to be resolved pursuant to the permanent funding mechanism being developed in Docket No. 911-019/PI-118, the Commission entered an order suspending the funding request on May 19, 2009.

Hearing on the request was held on January 19, 2010.

EVIDENCE

Julie Richter, Communications Coordinator for the City of Lincoln, testified in support of the application and requested that the Commission provide 100% funding for the amount sought. Ms. Richter provided average call volume statistics which showed that over the previous twelve months, Lincoln/Lancaster County's public safety answering point (PSAP) received 59,220 911 calls of which approximately 68% were wireless. Ms. Richter further testified that they have been planning for the new phone system for some time and that their previous equipment was installed in Furthermore, existing equipment is starting to experience problems. Ms. Richter stated that they are requesting funding for 13; however, she is immediately ready to install 10 and will be able to install the remaining three within the next six months. The PSAP currently has 10 positions and has determined that due to increased call volumes the additional 3 positions are needed.

OPINION AND FINDINGS

This request for additional funding is being processed pursuant to Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 86-442 to 86-470. (Cum. Supp. 2008), 291 Neb. Admin. Code, Chapter 1, Section 5, Progression Order No. 5 in Commission Docket No. 911-001, entered July 16, 2002 and the Interim Policy established in Progression Order No. 1 in Commission Docket No. 911-017/PI-116, entered February 13, 2007 (Interim Policy).

Based upon the request for funding, supporting documentation, and in consideration of the recommendation of the Advisory Board, the Commission is of the opinion and finds that costs requested, subject to the limitations set forth below, are eligible under $\underline{\text{Neb}}$. $\underline{\text{Rev}}$. $\underline{\text{Stat}}$. $\underline{\text{S}}$ 86-465 as all costs have been incurred or will be incurred for the purchase, installation, maintenance or operation of telecommunications equipment and telecommunications services required for the provision of enhanced wireless 911 service.

This funding request was received subsequent to February 16, 2007. Pursuant to the Interim Policy, the Commission therefore considers this funding request for reimbursement subject to the wireless/landline allocation factor established in the Commission's February 17, 2007 order of 55% wireless and 45% wireline unless the PSAP requests 100% for good cause.

The Commission is in the process of establishing a permanent funding mechanism in Docket 911-019/PI-118. Pursuant to the

current staff proposal, PSAPs would be permitted to set aside up to 75% of their funding allocation for the future purchase and installation of equipment and software. However, PSAPs would not be required to wait to apply for funding until sufficient funds have accumulated to cover the cost of the equipment and software. The staff has proposed that to the extent that there is an insufficient balance in the PSAP's equipment and software fund, the Commission could pay the appropriate percentage of the cost of the equipment and software and a deduction would be made from the annual allocation to the PSAP until the expense is reimbursed to the Fund the amount paid on behalf of the PSAP. At that point, the PSAP would again begin receiving its full allocation.

Lincoln/Lancaster County has previously received funding for equipment and software and the request at issue is a second The Commission does not wish to continue to hold the funding request until the full adoption of the permanent funding However, in fairness to other PSAPs, any amounts mechanism. awarded herein will be deducted in some manner from future allocations made under the permanent funding mechanism in Docket 911-019/PI-118. The mechanism for accounting for those amounts will depend upon the final order in that docket. Although, \$118,070.00 is attributable to items for which the Fund has not historically paid. The Commission intends to remove the restriction with the implementation of the permanent funding mechanism and will consider the entire request eligible for funding.

The Commission finds that Lincoln/Lancaster County's amended funding request shall be granted in part in the amount of \$619,480.00 which represents 68% of the amount requested to reflect the average percentage of wireless calls received over the previous twelve (12) months.

The Fund shall therefore pay to Lincoln/Lancaster County or its vendor as requested by the county the amount of \$619,480.00 consistent with the terms of this order. Funds shall be paid upon receipt of invoice.

The Commission shall incorporate the funding provided pursuant to this order into the allocation granted to the county based upon the final order in Docket 911-019/PI-118. Commencing with its first monthly payment under the permanent mechanism or upon the completion of the installation and payment for the equipment and software whichever is later, \$10,324.67 shall be deducted from Lincoln/Lancaster County's monthly allocations for a period of 60 months thereafter.

ORDER

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED by the Nebraska Public Service Commission that the Enhanced Wireless 911 Fund shall pay to Lincoln/Lancaster County or its vendor the amount of \$619,480.00 consistent with the terms of this order for the equipment necessary to provide enhanced wireless 911 service.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that commencing with its first monthly payment under the permanent mechanism or upon the completion of the installation and payment for the equipment and software whichever is later, \$10,324.67 shall be deducted from Lincoln/Lancaster County's monthly allocations for a period of 60 months thereafter.
