BY THE COMMISSION

Comes now the Communications Department of the Nebraska Public Service Commission with the results of the usage study compiled by US West Communications (US West) showing calls made from the Wakefield exchange to the Pender exchange pursuant to Application No. C-1687. The application, filed by the residents of the Wakefield exchange, requests authority for extended area service (EAS) from the Wakefield exchange in Wakefield, Nebraska, to the Pender exchange in Pender, Nebraska. Both Wakefield and Pender are served by US West. The application was verified by the Commission staff to have the requisite number of signatures on November 18, 1997. Notice of the application was published in The Daily Record, Omaha, Nebraska, on November 21, 1997.

O P I N I O N A N D F I N D I N G S

Pursuant to Nebraska Public Service Commission Rule 002.27B2c, US West filed a point-to-point traffic study showing calling from the Wakefield exchange to the Pender exchange.

The traffic study shows calls made from Wakefield to Pender for the three most recent months available. The results show the number of calls made per customer from Wakefield to Pender, as well as the number and percent of customers who made two or more calls per month from Wakefield to Pender.

By Commission Rule 002.27B2c, an application must demonstrate that an average of five or more calls are made per customer, per month and that more than fifty percent (50%) of the customers have made at least two calls per month to the petitioned exchange. In the present application, roughly 5.39 percent of the Wakefield subscribers made two or more calls per month to Pender. Further, there was not an average of five calls per customer, per month. Approximately 0.62 calls were made per customer during this time period. Therefore, the results do not meet the basic requirements set forth in the Commission Rules.

According to Commission Rule, 002.27B2c, if a petition fails to meet the basic criteria, an application will be dismissed without further action. Further, as Application No. C-1687 failed to pass the usage tests established by the Commission, a subsequent EAS petition may not be resubmitted for twenty-four months, pursuant to Commission Rule 002.27B2d.

After consideration of the application and being fully advised in the premises, the Commission is of the opinion and finds the application should be dismissed for failure to meet the requirements established in Commission Rule 002.27B2c. Further, the Commission finds the residents of the Wakefield exchange may not submit a petition for EAS to the Pender exchange for twenty-four months pursuant to Commission Rule 002.27B2d.

O R D E R

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED by the Nebraska Public Service Commission that Application No. C-1687 be, and it is hereby, dismissed.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that an application for extended area service may not be submitted by the Wakefield exchange, served by US West Communications, to the Pender exchange, also served by US West Communications, for twenty-four months.


